Purdue Profile Assignment (This assignment can simply be a profile assignment, too.)

For this assignment, you will choose a topic related to Purdue University to profile and research primary source materials from the Purdue Archives and Special Collections (ASC) on your specified topic. Examples of topics: professors, Purdue presidents, departments, buildings, clubs, student life, sports, fraternities, famous or influential alumni, residence halls, Purdue choirs, Purdue bands, train wreck, tank scrap, etc. If you want to choose a professor, alumna or alumnus, or a Purdue president, please choose someone before 1970. Looking at the timelines and information on the ASC website is a wonderful way for you to find a topic, as well. If you are going to focus on a broader topic, I strongly suggest that you narrow it down to a specific time period in order to avoid becoming overwhelmed. Once you choose a topic, you must first search the Archives collections database and e-Archives to make sure there is enough information on your topic to conduct reasonable research in the ASC. Do not forget to search the Oral Histories! There should be at least three archival sources on your topic, and you may certainly use secondary sources as well. If you have difficulty locating materials in the ASC on your topic, please come see me, and we will search together. You may also contact a staff member in the ASC at [archives@purdue.edu](mailto:archives@purdue.edu); however, I prefer you contact them AFTER you have chosen your topic. You may ask the staff if they have more information on your topic once you have completed your initial research. Do not go to the ASC empty-handed and expect the archivists to do your work for you.

Things to consider while researching:

What is particularly interesting about this topic? Is there anything surprising that you were not expecting to find? Is there anything specific that makes your topic an influential or integral part of Purdue history or history? Is there a purpose to viewing these original documents as opposed to seeing them online? Did you experience any challenges? What were your experiences in researching your topic and looking at the original documents?

Once you have gathered all of the information on your topic, I want you to compile your findings into a coherent 2-3 page paper; you should not simply list your findings. The point is not to write a biography or a history of your topic. This is more of an investigative assignment, so you do have some freedom with what you choose to write. Remember to use the questions above to help guide you. Your papers should be in MLA format with 12 point Times New Roman font. You should also have a works cited page; if you are not certain how to cite primary sources from the ASC, go to the OWL website or come see me. This assignment will require you to visit the reading room in the Archives and Special Collections; you will need to register at the front desk.
